Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) About Your Procedure

How long does it take to perform the AMS 800[™] Artificial Urinary Sphincter (AUS) procedure?

The procedure is minimally invasive and usually takes about an hour and a half. The AUS procedure is generally performed in an outpatient setting, which means patients go home the same day or early the following morning.

Will anyone be able to visually tell I have an implant?

Once in place, your implant will not be able to be seen. It's fully concealed in the body. No one will know unless you tell them—even in the locker room.

How long is recovery?

Your urologist will manage your care following your procedure and over the next several weeks. At the four- to six-week follow-up appointment, your urologist will activate the AUS and teach you how to use the AUS device.

Potential risks may include: device malfunction/failure leading to additional surgery, wearing away/loss of tissue (device/tissue erosion), inability to urinate (urinary retention), infection, and pain/soreness.
